How can make sure that my conclusion is effective?

The conclusion is an important part of your text. It is the final impression that you will leave upon the audience/reader.



What is a conclusion?

- A conclusion is the last paragraph of your writing.
- It is the way that you round off your ideas.
- It is an important element in the structure of your text.
- It is the final impression that you will leave upon the reader.
- It should reinforce the stance that you have taken in your text.
- It should leave the reader thinking about the argument that you have presented

There are a range of effective techniques that can be used to conclude your argue/ persuade text. Your job in the examination is to choose which one is most suitable for the question that you are answering.

Rhetorical question.

For example, if you take the introduction of:

Is your life boring, bleak and repetitive? Have you had enough of being stuck inside playing mind-numbing computer games?

You could adapt this to:

To conclude therefore, is your life boring, bleak and repetitive? Have you had enough of being stuck inside playing mind-numbing computer games? Then you need to take up abseiling as soon as possible!

Implore your target audience.

Use direct address to appeal to the emotions of the intended audience.

Therefore, in conclusion I implore you to consider taking up jogging as a new hobby. It will make you happier, healthier and fitter!



A rhetorical question with a powerful statement.

For example, if you have just written a text persuading your friend to take up jogging as a hobby, you could conclude with:

So, what have you got to lose? Taking up jogging could seriously improve your life!

End with a strong statement that summarises your argument.

For example:

Undoubtedly, taking up jogging will change your life. Your physical health, mental health and general well-being will all benefit from this new hobby. Start today!
